All Things in Order

The order in which you play cards, either as declarer or defender, plays a significant role in how well you perform the task at hand. This column demonstrates declarer's need to take her tricks in the proper sequence.

In the auction, North holds a minimum for her 2H call, but the fact that her cards are “prime” indicates some aggression is warranted. South’s 3C call, by agreement, is forcing after the reverse. After that, a sequence of cuebids allowed South to bid the grand slam.

The opening lead is the deuce of diamonds. At first glance, declarer has three spade tricks, two hearts, one diamond, and five clubs in top cards — a total of 11 tricks. Two diamond ruffs in the dummy will bring her total to the requisite 13 and justify such aggressive, but accurate, bidding. If declarer pulls trump, she won’t be able to ruff both diamond losers, so she starts by winning the diamond Ace, ruffing a diamond, returning a spade to her King, and leading a third diamond, trumping it in the dummy. She now plays the club Ace and Queen, and trumps a small spade back to her hand. Now, and only now, does she pull the last trump, lead a heart to the King, and cash the spade A and Q, pitching hearts, and claiming the last two tricks with the heart Ace and club 9.

Notice that this line of play succeeds even if clubs are 4-0, so long as West holds at least one spade...extremely probable since a good West would double 7C with a spade void so as to trump the opening lead.

The auction provides enough information (West has at least five diamonds) to make ruffing diamonds the obvious route to tricks 12 and 13.

Winter Solution



DOES ANYONE OUT THERE REMEMBER THE TWO-STEP?

MP's - both vulnerable, you South hold: ♠J62 ♥QJ73 ♦Q6 ♣KQ82

So, just how much leeway are we going to give a vulnerable 3rd seat opener at matchpoints? And, if we choose to bid at this juncture in the auction, what is our best course of action? The answers that follow will show a wide range of beliefs as to how to proceed. Let's begin with those who think they can do better on defense than offense.

ERIC RUBEN: “Pass. I know I am likely dissenting here, but I want to swallow RHO whole here. My soft values don't really cry offense here in any case. Have I mentioned that lovely club 8-spot?”

MARTY O'MALLEY: “Pass, my tricks are slow and I would rather defend; hoping partner can re-open with a double. If partner bids anything else, I will raise.” (*Moderator: boy, they must overcall some real trash vulnerable vs. you guys at MP's. I would make book that RHO has by far the best hand at the table...*)”

Next - those who want to check on a heart fit.

DAVID ROTTMAYER: “Double. At least partner will know how many hearts I have. I am not willing to defend, so I don't need to give partner a chance to make a takeout double. I feel I have too many major suit cards to risk defending. If partner bids 2♦, I'll bid 2♠. If he bids 2♠, I will raise to 3. I play that if partner bids 2♥ over this negative double, he promises 4+ hearts, so I will raise that, too, if he should bid 2♥. With 3/3 in hearts and diamonds, partner should bid 2♦, not 2♥ - a useful treatment.”

RON KRUEGER: “Double. I know that partner opened in third seat and may be light, but I've gotta get hearts into the picture. If partner doesn't have hearts, how bad can Jxx of spades be to go back to?”

JONATHAN STEINBERG: “How hungry are you? How light would partner open in 3rd seat, red, at matchpoints? A trap pass, X, 2♠, 2NT & 3♣ are all possibilities. With such soft NTish values, I'll forego a penalty and start with a negative double, hoping to get more information. I'll bid 2NT over a 2♦ response, give partner a gentle raise to 3 in a major if partner responds 2 of either major.”

MARK HANFT: “Double. Gives me the most room to maneuver. Partner may have opened light, and 2S may be our last making contract.”

MAX GALLOTTI: “Double. Since my partner is a third seat opener, this seems my most prudent bid at this time.”

JOEL SINGER: “Double. Has no one out there ever opened light in 3rd seat, even vulnerable? This hand is not as good as the point count suggests, and is defensive. Double, to show values and a heart suit. If partner bids diamonds, I can always prefer to spades.”

GERRY McCULLY: “Double, followed by 2NT on partner’s likely 2♦ response.”

MARILYN HEMENWAY: I seem to have several choices, and the rule is that when that happens, I will always pick the worst one. However, I never give up, so I make a negative double and see what partner has to say. Then, I will probably make another bad decision the next time around. I’m really not that pessimistic, but sometimes bad luck follows me around. (*Moderator: I feel like doing some surfing on the ‘net and finding poor Marilyn a good psychologist*).

How about the LOW road?

WARREN WATSON: “I would bid a conservative 2♠. Partner was in 3rd seat, and the clubs may not be too useful (either partner or LHO is short in clubs). The doubleton diamond queen may also not be too useful.”

STOLTZ: “2♠. Show support as soon as possible is my mantra. This collection of quacks is not worth more than a single raise, especially after a 3rd seat opening. If partner invites, then I will accept in some way.”

ROD CALDWELL: “2♠, this is a crappy hand. People open such garbage these days, maybe 2♠ can't even make! At IMP's, however, I would try 2NT, as that seems to be the closest to any game invitation that's reasonable.”

BARB CORN: “I know everyone likes to cue-bid these days, but partner is in 3rd seat, after all, so I shall scale back and bid just 2♠. 45% of my values are in a suit that I know partner is (relatively) short in. In addition, the doubleton Q of diamonds may not be pulling its full weight. I can always catch up later, if the bidding continues. If my bid ends the auction, then 2♠ was likely correct.”

How about inviting in NT?

RICHEL PAVLICEK, Jr.: “2NT. I need to describe my hand, and feel this is the best choice. Most importantly, I want to discourage partner, if he does not have a hand that will bid over 2NT.”

BILL ROTTMAYER: “2NT. Invitational and protects my minor suit honors. It's an easy choice at IMP's. A cowardly 2♠ is more tempting at MP's, especially if partner opens quite light in 3rd seat.” (*Moderator: I suggest you discuss this hand-type with your son, sir*)

GEORGE HARRIS: “2NT. I believe partner should be permitted to open very light in 3rd seat. Penalty pass is out of the question unless you are a very hungry player. Amongst other things, +200 or +500 may not be enough. The eight of clubs and slow red cards are not enough to suggest a penalty pass to me. I am a bit worried about the sneak attack in diamonds against 2NT or 3NT, but when all is said and done, 3NT is game. I am not going to hang partner, even though I have one of the few 11's that I, too, would not have opened. There is always that extra ten points in 2NT versus a spade partial. So, there you have it; I have persuaded myself not to raise partner even though I believe supporting partner is one of the most important parts of the game.”

DARREL KEEL: "First choice is 2NT, bidding where I "live." Second choice would be 2♠ and accept any game try."

MORRIE KLEINPLATZ: "Great problem. There are, of course, 4 reasonable answers: P, X, 2♠ & 2NT. I suppose even 3♣ is in the running, though I hate to hang partner for opening in 3rd seat. Likewise, passing and playing for +200 is risky, for partner may not choose to re-open w/double facing a twice-passing partner and b) they may make 2♣ anyways with all the "junk" you hold, meanwhile we have a spade fit our way. I prefer the "value" bid of 2NT. This might well play better than 2♠ anyways, and the auction is not necessarily done."

Three of our panelists bid 3♣, but not a one of them offered up any cogent arguments as to why.

ME?? *I am a negative doubler, secure in the belief that regardless if partner bids 2H, I can go back to 2♠ & partner should play me for almost this exact amount of HCP's, if not this exact shape.*

That is, around 10-11 HCP's with 3♠ & 4♥, for if I had less in HCP's, I would just raise to 2♠ instead. It's called the old two-step in dancing parlance. And, if I had more in HCP's, well, to quote my loving wife "Why, that's just not possible". With all of these slow values, the hand just isn't worth more, in my mind. Too many queens and jacks for my liking. And, so, it's a useful tool to have in one's toolbox.

When partner opens 1♠, I don't care in what seat, a negative double by me, followed by taking his 2♥ bid back to 2♠ should show 3♠, 4♥ and around limit raise values. The bonus, of course, is that I get to show all of this at the 2-level, not driving us to the 3-level. It will come up often enough where the limit of the hands are 8 tricks, that we get to turn some of our marginal hands into plus scores, while others with our cards cannot.
